

Dr. Kristine Buniel went to Dapa, Siargao Island, Surigao del Norte on October 26, 2021 to help in an optometry clinic her aunt is running. She found herself busy with the thriving clinic as there were not many eye care practitioners in the area. The idyllic seaside life in Siargao made the days pass by quickly and enjoyably for Dr Kristine. Then Odette struck.

The area where the clinic is located was not spared by the grunt of the super typhoon and suffered extensive damages. Power, water, and communication services went down.

Days after the devastation, the clinic opens again. Together with her aunt, they continue to service vision care needs of the

community with whatever resources they have left. Faced with such a dire situation, Dr. Kristine asked PODS for help, and PODS responded.

Now, Dr Kristine travels from her hometown (Cantilan, Surigao del Sur) to Siargao back and forth every few weeks for resources (food, water, gasoline, etc).

As the situation on the island is stabilizing, Dr. Kristine vowed to continue helping the community until the clinic and the practice have gotten back to some semblance of normalcy.

Dr. Kristine has been practicing for 6 years and is currently based in her hometown of Cantillan, Surigao del Sur. Her areas of special interest are in pediatrics and prosthesis. When Dr. Douren Espina, a PODS stalwart who practices in Tacloban City, Leyte, heard of the devastation brought by Odette, she immediately mobilized people and gathered resources to respond.

With friends and church-mates, she was able to collect funds, food, water and other badly needed relief items and send them to Panaon Island, Southern Leyte. The effort is ongoing.

PODS, for its part, has committed to provide support to ODs whose practices have been disrupted. It is hoped that, with the help and resources that PODS would be able to muster, these optometrists would be able to continue providing vision care services to their constituents.



Also, in consideration of ODs living or practicing in areas suffering from power outages and communication disruptions, PODS rescheduled some online events.

Though we hope that none, or just less, of these calamities visit us, it is encouraging that if they do happen, they also bring to focus the innate goodness in all of us.
